Forcing One Notrump Response to a Major Suit Opening

Partner opens with "1 Heart" or "1 Spade".

Normally a 1 Notrump response shows 6-10 points.

Playing the **forcing notrump response**, this changes to 6-12 points. Opener bids a second time to allow Responder to bid again.

☺ Advantages:

 \Rightarrow When weak Responder has a long suit

 \Rightarrow Direct Limit Raise can promise *four* trumps

 \Rightarrow Two-over-one responses become stronger

② Disadvantages:

 \Rightarrow One Notrump may have been the best contract.

Opener's Rebid:

 \oplus If Opener would normally have rebid, make same rebid.

 \oplus With a minimum balanced hand, bid a three-card minor.

Two Ranges for a Forcing Notrump:

Minimum Range: 6-9 Points

- \Rightarrow 2 of Opener's original major (shows two-card support)
- \Rightarrow a new suit (shows a six-card or longer suit)
- \Rightarrow pass denies either of the above

Invitational Range: 10-12 Points

- \Rightarrow 3 of Opener's original major (a *three-card* limit raise)
- \Rightarrow Jump to 3 of a new suit (shows a six-card or longer suit)
- \Rightarrow 2NT (may have an unbid five-card suit)
- \Rightarrow 3 of Opener's second suit (at least four-card support)
