#### **Active vs Passive Defense**

- Defense is the most challenging part of bridge
- Key question: Should you "attack" or play "safe"
  - i.e. use Active or Passive Defense?
- Good defenders make a conscious decision
- Easy to lose focus during defense
- On defense be ready for some serious thinking
- What should you and your partner be thinking about?
- Its not black & white, a lot of judgment and learning

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#### Passive Defense

- When it comes to defense, PASSIVE is NOT weakness, but rather an intentional strategy
- Passive Defense is the art of sitting back and waiting for declarer to lose what she must
- Make safe leads so declarer only wins a trick that she would win anyways
- Don't play a new suit for declarer that she will have to play herself
  - This is an extremely common mistake!

#### **Active Defense**

- Also called Aggressive Defense
- We can't always sit back and wait, in Passive Defense, because declarer may be able to discard losers or ruff them in the dummy
- In those cases we need to be proactive i.e. Active Defense
- Types of Active Defense
  - Attempting to establish or cash tricks before declarer discards losers
    - i.e. leading low from an honor, from an A, or even leading an honor
  - Attempting to get a ruff (or trump promotion), or give partner one
  - · Leading trump to prevent declarer from ruffing losers

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## What's The Declarer Thinking?

Developing a plan to make the contract

- Count the losers in each suit in the Master Hand
- Develop options to reduce the number of losers
  - Trump in the short hand (usually dummy but not always e.g. transfer)
  - Discard on a winner from another suit
  - Finesse
- Decide to draw trump now or not
- Prioritize options to reduce losers
- Execute it's often a race with the Defenders

## What Do Expert Defenders Think About When Dummy Comes Down?

- Applies to BOTH defenders Defense is a team game!
- Review the bidding and determine what is known about declarer's hand
- Look at partner's lead and the first trick to determine what is known about the suit led
- Study the dummy and ask yourself What will declarer do with his losers?
- The dummy is the key to Active vs Passive Defense!
  - Eddie Kantar LSD (Long, Short, Dead)
  - Jerry Helms BOP (Bid, Opening lead, Points)
  - Marty Bergen "I never met a 5 card suit I didn't like"
  - Debbie Rosenberg...

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## Debbie's Advice When Analyzing The Dummy

- Ask yourself What will declarer do with his losers?
- A few possible answers and actions to take
  - Declarer has winners in the dummy and will be able to discard on them
    - ACTIVE defense get your tricks before they go away, may need to cash out
    - NOTE when there is an abundance of trump in dummy, need to consider dummy's losers going away on winners from declarer's hand
  - It appears declarer will be able to trump losers in dummy
    - Dummy must have a short suit, usually 2 or fewer
    - · Especially look for hands where dummy is worthless for any other purpose except ruffing
    - ACTIVE defense lead trump to (try) to stop ruffs
  - Nothing
    - If dummy has no source of tricks & declarer has tricks to lose in his hand, "let him" lose them
    - A flat dummy looks like PASSIVE Defense may be right

#### **Passive Defense**

• You may encounter the following

J32

AT94 K76

Q85

- If defenders start this suit, from either side, they ONLY GET 2 TRICKS
- If declarer starts this suit, defenders should (!!) get ALL 3 TRICKS
  - · Second hand low, cover an honor with an honor
- REPEAT: Don't start a new suit for declarer that he will have to start himself

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#### **Passive Defense**

- When you've decide the best approach is Passive, now what?
  - Give declarer only what she is entitled to, but how?
- Passive Defense examples
  - Lead a suit in which dummy has AK doubleton or equivalent
  - Lead trump if you are not worried about finessing partner out of a trump trick
  - Lead, or continue a suit you know declarer will ruff in her hand, as long as you aren't setting up anything in the dummy
  - Often, playing back the suit the declarer just led will be Passive

- Then the opening lead will be prescribed. Please make that lead
- We will discuss after each hand, so please do not start the next one
