PROFILE OF PAT AND ROBIN CHAMBERS BY MARY VAN TAMELEN



What's the first thing most people do when they get married? Probably not what Pat and Robin Chambers did. They both went to work that day, then got married, and immediately after their wedding they went to a bridge game

at their local club.

They met at a bridge tournament in Dunsmuir, CA. Pat says she found Robin "under a deck of cards" and thought to herself that this man needs help. They started playing together, one thing led to another, and soon they were married *and* playing bridge.

Pat came to northern California from Minneapolis, Robin from the Isle of Wight. She was divorced with one son and living in Redding. Robin had majored in French at the University of Southampton. He lived in France for a while, then moved to Manitoba, Canada, went to Santa Barbara for a master's degree and was teaching French at Dunsmuir High School.

After their marriage in 1974, there were no teaching jobs available in Redding, so they moved here. Pat worked in the accounting department at Stanford Hospital, a job she held for 22 years. Robin worked as an office and credit manager for an electronics firm for several years, and then decided he'd "better do something with his life." So, in his words, in 1980 he "became a parasite" and spent the next seventeen years as a stockbroker, first with Merrill Lynch and then with Charles Schwab.

"We're lucky we have bridge," Pat says, referring to their retirement years. They play together frequently and don't fight—although they admit to "sometimes a little tension." There used to be a lot more: Robin would "get testy," Pat says; and Pat would get "pissed off," responds Robin. Yet, they acknowledge and praise each other's proficiencies. Robin comments that "Pat is an outstanding defender," and Pat acknowledges that "Robin is an excellent bidder."

Robin has studied and analyzed his bidding system

and has written a 150 page text, including quizzes. Currently, on an alternating basis, the two of them are mentoring Vera Howard and Ginger Tanner.

Outside of bridge Pat and Robin are proud of Pat's son Steve, a musician who plays guitar and keyboard with the revival of the Credence Clearwater Revisited group. Pat and Robin are also the godparents and frequent caretakers of Bosco, a schnauzer who belongs to Chuck Lane. "Sharing is the very best way to have a dog," they say, "you can go to tournaments and are not tied down, yet have all the joy."

The Chambers do like to travel, especially to tournaments. They feel they are so lucky to live in this area with such a "great caliber club, with such fine players." Pat and Robin are prime examples, often coming in on top.

The day they were married they must have been somewhat distracted—they only came in second!
