DATE CHANGE FOR JULY 199ER MONDAY NIGHT SWISS

Mark your calendars for *JULY* 9. Because the Firecracker Sectional ends July 1, the chances of your being all "bridged out" the next night are pretty high. No problem. We moved the game to the next week.

If you're not familiar with the Unit Game First Monday 199er Swiss Teams, here are the facts: The game is for a team of four and the *average* master points of the four must be fewer than 200. The game is stratified into two sections; Section A has a limit of 200 and Section B, 100. It's a great introduction to team games! Since it is a Unit Championship game, the points awarded are higher than usual. Start time is 6:30 p.m. We try to be finished at 10 p.m..

We use BridgePads for scoring, so the game moves along quickly. You don't have to compute the IMP difference manually. At the end of the round, the BridgePads give you the IMPS, the Victory Points, and advise you where to go. If these

terms are not familiar to you, Margot Livenspargar, the director, is happy to explain them.

It is helpful if you sign up ahead of the game on the Unit Website. On the left side of the Home Page is a section called Special Events and under that is the Online Signup link. If you need two or three partners for your team, you can indicate it there AND in the Partnership Desk, which can be found on the same Home Page under Games. Of course you can always come and hope someone else shows up and needs a partner or team mates.

As usual at the Bridge Center, there are yummy snacks, coffee, tea and friendly people.

At our most recent game on June 6, with four wins, the most successful team consisted of Joe Buchanan, Joy Barrett, Henry Wen and Shirley Streifer. Congratulations to them.

BRIDGE CENTER MANAGEMENT AND FINANCES

Here is some history and background information about the Palo Alto Bridge Center. The Palo Alto Bridge Unit started in 1957. The first Bridge Center opened in March 1975 at Elwell Court. Deposits made by club owners who chose to hold their games there provided the initial funding. But the Unit agreed to assume the financial risk and to provide management (via the Board and Treasurer), collect rent from the owners and then pay the landlord. On May 28, 2000, the Elwell Bridge Center closed. With the expiration of this lease, the owners' deposits were refunded.

From that time until June 2002, the owners of the weekday clubs ran their games at the YWCA on Alma St. and the Friday night and weekend games ceased operation. The Bridge Center at Terminal Blvd opened in June 2002. The relationship between the club owners and the Unit remained as at Elwell under a license agreement with the owners renting space from the Unit and the Unit paying the Twisters as a tenant under a sublease.

Our Unit is not typical. In the country there are only about 20 units, (this number may have increased), which have a space leased by the board of the unit and not by club owners. Most unit boards have no authority over what club owners do.

Club owners may play their games at the Bridge Center or outside (such as the games owned by Walter Miller and John Schwartz). Owners who play at the Bridge Center pay rent to the Center based on the number of players at their games, currently \$15.00/table. They also pay a sanction fee to the ACBL. Owners whose games are not held at the Center do not pay rent to the Bridge Center, but do pay for supplies used from the Center.

Therefore, Bridge Center costs are paid for by the table fees. That is the primary B.C. income, supplemented by rent for classes taught there, along with a few other small items. For the first 9 months of 2011 (while we were still at the Terminal Way facility), monthly revenues averaged \$9.8K from club owner and Unit Game rent, plus \$.6K from education rent, for a total of about \$10K per month. At the new B.C. we estimate our fixed costs to be around \$K10. per month, as detailed in the next column:

We will need to get some real-time data over the next few months to establish a baseline and will then readjust our forecasts.

We do not try to make a significant profit on the running of the Bridge Center. However, we do need to be able to ensure that we can meet our fixed costs and have some cushion in case of emergency or changes to our situation.

In determining rents that we charge club owners, we walk a tightrope in order to meet our expenses, attract and retain excellent owners and provide affordable games for our players. As you probably know, our owners aren't doing this to get rich. They put in enormous efforts in return for a relatively small financial gain. Their income comes from their table fees minus their expenses, which include table rental fees (at B.C. only), food and other incidentals and sometimes the cost of a second director. If they sell their club, anything received is based on their goodwill/clientele and time slot at the Bridge Center. The Unit receives no compensation.

Our club owners set the table fees for their games: the Unit has no control over table fees charged. In our Unit, most games charge \$8 or \$9 per person. The Unit wants to keep the table fees competitive with other games in the area, both to make it affordable to members and to allow the club owner to earn a profit. The only way the Unit can directly impact club owner income is through the table fees charged to them.

CLASSES, CLASSES AND MORE CLASSES By Lori Spaeth, Education Liaison

We are very fortunate to have so many players interested in improving their game. We are also very lucky to have a wonderful Bridge Center which allows us to hold so many activities: classes, lectures and learning games, not to mention having a game every single day and two nights a week, on Wednesday and Friday.

We will have many classes starting in September. All will be at the Bridge Center, 432 Stierlin Road. The list includes: BEGINNING (Thursday mornings), BASIC/INTERMEDIATE (Monday evenings and Tuesday mornings), INTERMEDIATE(Thursday evenings), INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED (Monday afternoon, Tuesday evening, Friday afternoon)

Here they are, in the order in which they start, with a brief description:

- 1. Monday afternoons starting September 10 from 3:30-5:45, Debbie Rosenberg will teach "Defend Like a Pro," 8 lessons for INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED players.
- 2. Monday evenings starting September 10 from 7:00-9:00, Kathy Harper will teach a 12-lesson (usually every two weeks) "Polish Your Basics" class. This class is BASIC/INTERMEDIATE second-year beginning bridge students or players who have played before but want a refresher.
- 3.Tuesday mornings starting September 11 from 9:15-11:15, Kathy Harper will teach "Conventions You Need to Play" (12 weeks). This class is BASIC/INTERMEDIATE and is in preparation of the Thursday evening Intermediate I & II classes (the "gap" year)
- 4. Tuesday evenings starting September 11 from 6:45-9:00, Debbie Rosenberg will teach "Play Like a Pro," 8 lessons for INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED players.
- 5. Thursday mornings starting September 13 from 9:15-11:15, Kathy Harper will teach a BEGINNER Bridge Class, 12 lessons (usually every two weeks).
- 6. Thursday evenings starting September 13, from 7:00-9:30, Frank Smoot will teach Intermediate

II, 12 weekly lessons, for INTERMEDIATE and INTER-MEDIATE-PLUS players, with a focus on intermediate bidding and intermediate-advanced concepts in play.

7. Friday afternoons starting September 14, from 3:15-5:30, Debbie Rosenberg will teach "Defend Like a Pro" (same as Monday), 8 lessons for INTER-MEDIATE/ADVANCED players.

All class topics are already listed on our website and you may sign up for these classes now at <u>paloaltobridge.com/education/classes/</u>. Classes cost between \$150 to \$200 per series.
