BOUNDLESS OPTIMISM BY POLLY SIEGEL

The other day at the club, playing with one of my favorite partners, I picked up the following hand as South in 4th seat, white versus red:

▲1074 **♥**1065 **♦**AQ54 **♣**Q96

W, on my left, opened 3C; partner overcalled 3D, E passed. What's your call?

Marveling at our incredible diamond fit, and holding what looked like a stopper, I could count 7 tricks. Partner must have two more for me, right? I confidently bid 3NT, which passed out.

On the lead of the \$5, dummy came down.

▲K96 **♥**Q98 **♦**KJ10762 **♣**4

Focused on counting my tricks, I completely missed the dearth of high cards in dummy. Of course what did it matter, really? Six diamonds, possibly one club, and if I were really lucky, maybe a spade. Down one seemed possible. I called for the club 4, RHO winning the K. He now played the club 10. What do you do now?

If RHO started with K10 of clubs, then it didn't matter what I did unless I ducked and my LHO made a defensive error by not overtaking. If he had three clubs, my play also wouldn't matter unless he started with KJ10 or AK10, in which case it would be important to cover. But wouldn't he have led the J from KJ10? And if RHO had AK10, wouldn't that mean LHO had preempted 3 clubs, unfavorable, on J8xxxx? I decided to duck and hope for a misplay.

The club 10 held, but RHO continued with the club J, LHO winning the A. Had I played the club Q, the suit would have blocked and RHO would have had to guess how to get back to partner's hand (however, as you'll later see, it was pretty clear how to do so).

As LHO was running the clubs, dummy was getting squeezed. I pitched a spade, then a heart, and finally a diamond, again, my optimism getting the best of me wanting to be able to run all my beautiful diamonds as soon as I got in. LHO cashed the heart A, and then shifted to a low spade. RHO won the AQ of spades and then ran all his spades. When all was said and done, I was down 9, the opponents having taken all 13 tricks! We almost received a late play since I couldn't stop laughing for several minutes.


Lectures - On October 7 Frank Smoot will explain the use of "Splinters." The October 21 lecture features Ron Karr with insight into "Rebids by Responder."



PROFILE OF JOHN SCHWARTZ

John Schwartz played bridge in college at Cornell where he studied physics, and then there was a hiatus of forty-five years in which he never picked up a bridge hand.

But he was busy during those years: getting a law degree from Harvard, practicing tax law in Phoenix, deciding he "really liked physics after all" and getting a PhD in physics and coming to teach at Stanford. That year was 1968, the turbulent time of student protests. Through a chance meeting with a Harvard classmate, John became involved. Soon he left teaching and joined the Stanford administration full time, handling all the student disruptions, like rock throwing and sitins.

When the protests died down, he then served as Counsel for Medical Affairs, devising a model program that was adopted by Stanford University, after which John became Counsel General. He was "Stanford's Legal Eagle," as a cover story in a newspaper named him. Called the driving force behind what became Stanford's "tough as nails posture," John took the university from easy prey to a fierce opponent when it considered itself in the right. He served for two decades through the presidencies of Richard Lyman and Donald Kennedy. He regards it as "a dream career to have worked with two such principled individuals with the determination and resources to adhere to those principles."

After retiring from Stanford in 1993, John became General Counsel and then CEO of Systemix, a public biotech company and retired again when the company was purchased by Novartis. At that point, as a registered investment advisor, John formed his own investment management firm. He is currently Chairman of the Board of Directors of StemCells, Inc.

John's hobbies have been as diverse as his careers. He has flown his own plane to Europe and Central and South America. Enjoying various sports, he played tennis several hours a day on his own court until his back gave out, fly fished in waters around the world, helicopter skied throughout the West, and alpine raced to place number one in California for those over 55.

Finally, after forty-five years, he came back to bridge. John directs the Monday morning game at the Bridge Center and the Thursday morning game at the JCC. With John Williams, he began teaching a 2/1 class before the Monday games; this brought the attendance up to 40 tables. His goal has been to attract more junior players in limited sections while still providing an open section. Running his games is a family affair. His wife, Alicia, does all the food shopping, her daughter makes the boards and his son, Rusty, helps and encourages.

John's aim is "to try to make each game perfect" with all the players treated respectfully, few director calls, no slow tables and every person having a pleasant time. So far, he says, the feat of a perfect game eludes him, but he keeps trying.
