#### Become a Life Saver....Better Than a Life

Master! - Our Unit has recently acquired an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and other materials for a first aid program, and it now wishes to make Red Cross training available at no cost to Unit members who play at the Bridge Center at least once a week. In many cases, the minutes between the onset of a medical emergency and the arrival of emergency medical personnel after a 911 call are a critical time that can make the difference between a full recovery for the sufferer and something less. Early intervention can sometimes save a life.

The course consists of 2.5 hours of online study and 2 hours of in-class skills training, the latter to be held at the Bridge Center on Tuesday evenings. Here is a description from the Red Cross website:

The Adult First Aid/CPR/AED course incorporates the latest science and teaches students to recognize and care for a variety of first aid emergencies such as burns, cuts, scrapes, sudden illnesses, head, neck, back injuries, heat and cold emergencies and how to respond to breathing and cardiac emergencies for victims about 12 years and older. Successful students will receive a certificate for Adult First Aid/CPR/AED valid for two years. This course combines online learning and a classroom skills session. Online learning must be completed prior to attending the classroom session. Details will be included via email once you register. This course will not work in Google Chrome.

## **UNIT 503 LIBRARY**

The Unit library opened in September, 2008, thanks to funding from donations to the Unit 503 Education Fund from the ACBL Educational Foundation. Donna Armstrong took charge to get things underway. Books donated by the ACBL and unit members were catalogued and displayed in new cabinets, a simple check out procedure established, and publicized on the website. Donna, unfortunately, passed away and Fran Bennett and Valerie Baldwin stepped in and are doing an outstanding job.

The library now has 738 books and 36 pamphlets (Marty Bergen). Donations continue and Fran purchases books by popular bridge experts and previews them in the *Kibitzer*.

The Unit owes a warm debt of gratitude to Fran and Val for their untiring and dedicated efforts to provide this valuable resource to Unit members and friends. Our hearty thanks to them both.

## THE DEUCE, BY LEE HAZE

In our favorite game the deuce is the lowest card in all four suits; this lowly card often seems to be insignificant. In hand evaluation, the deuce is rarely noticed and becomes of importance only as an extra point added for suit length. However, sometimes the deuce provides clues that the wise declarer and/or defender carefully observes. These clues may come from the appearance of the deuce, or for its FAILURE to appear. That failure can be an indicator of who has it and may signal a path chosen in the play of the hand by declarer. The opposite is also true; its appearance in which trick it was played on and by whom may provide information.

Although partnership agreements can alter this, the opening lead of a deuce generally indicates a four card suit. Awareness of this clue can be helpful to both declarer (who wants to know how many of those spades or clubs, etc. the leader has) and to leader's partner (who wants to help by unblocking or overtaking where necessary). When partner leads a small card (say the four) and the deuce fails to appear on the trick, this may be an indication that partner holds the deuce and is leading fourth best from five. A wily declarer holding the deuce may hold onto it, hoping to mislead the defense.

Beginning players regard the deuce as the first available discard (outside of trump) because of its lack of trick taking value. However, the discard of the deuce may offer clues about partner's holdings, depending upon the partnership's defensive signals; for example the deuce might say, "lead this again, pard" (upside down signals) or possibly, " I don't like this suit, but please lead the lower ranking suit" (odd-even signals).

I personally am ALWAYS interested in knowing the location and treatment of all the deuces. Of course the deuces in your hand or dummy eliminate your need to know, but the failure to appear of remaining deuces begins to be more important to declarer and defenders as the hand is played out. While it always is the lowest suited card in play its value increases as a long card or as a still available trump. As declarer, to keep open communication between hand and dummy, it sometimes helps to hide the deuce from yourself, by tucking it in with higher cards. This keeps you from discarding it inadvertently, when it might be needed later as transportation to the trey in dummy.

So we see the little deuce, once thought to have little value, has a role to play.
